#### **Media Literacy**

Location: Bush Hall Dave Lehman

The average daily time spent (not all in the same day!, but averaged over time) with various media for 15-18 year olds is 3:41 (3 hours and 41 minutes) with "screen media" (TV, videos/DVDs, movies); 1:19 with radio; 1:09 with CDs/tapes/ MP3s; 1:14 with various computer activities; and only 0:44 with "print media" (books, magazines, newspapers)! An overwhelming number of students - including college students- do not know how to judge the credibility of sources on the internet! Sixty-four percent of sexually active teens name themedia - not parents, friends or teachers - as their source of information about sex! In 2001, alcohol companies spent \$31 million for ads during 13 of the 15 most popular TV shows among kids ages 12-17! By the age of 5, U.S. children spend more hours watching television than any other single activity except sleep - 21-25 hours a week! In this workshop, after looking at data such as this, participants will be engaged in specific activities and will work with several resources to begin to learn how to instruct students - elementary through college - in becoming "media literate," critical users of, and not manipulated by, media in today's society.

#### Better Meeting Skills (ends at 11am)

Why is it that, although meetings are necessary, they are often difficult, time-consuming and even painful experiences? Perhaps one of the reasons is that few of us take the time to learn better meeting skills. In this workshop, participants will learn skills and techniques designed to improve their experience in meetings. Exercises will be used to encourage creative conflict resolution, self-empowerment, respect for diversity, and appreciation of different perspectives and opinions. These skill-building exercises will provide experiential learning in areas of agenda planning, facilitation techniques, small group discussion and evaluation. The beginner as well as the experienced facilitator will find this workshop stimulating and valuable. This workshop can accommodate up to 50 participants.

#### Does Montessori Prepare Children for the Real World?

#### A Picture History of the Ferrer Modern Schools

Modern Schools were founded in the United States and many countries after Francisco Ferrer, founder of the Escuela Moderna in Spain, was executed in 1909. The Modern School philosophy was freedom in education that was not different from the idea of free schools of today. Modern Schools in the U.S. lasted from 1911 to 1958. My presentation is intended to capture for you, in pictures, what went on at the Modern Schools, first founded in New York City by Emma Goldman, Alexander Berkman and other anarchists that was later moved to Stelton, NJ. I will discuss the principles used by the teachers and my own experience at the school that I attended from 1934 to 1946. Anytime two people have a conversation, learning occurs. Three people having a conversation creates a learning web. Learning webs are the basis for creating sustainable learning communities in the 21st century. This workshop focuses on the tools and practices that can provide caring, local, intimate learning communities with opportunities to explore the world, engage and exchange creative energies, comprehend and contribute to cultural diversity, develop and spread democratic ideals, and reflect on the new media interactions that empower the voices of an emerging civil, ethical, democratic society in the third millenium. Workshop participants will be provided with an engaging tour of the future of learning - through ubiquitous communication, collaboration, and community building regardless of time or place. The workshop will demonstrate tools and present best practices that explode a 20th century education model that relies on "bricks and mortar," GPA's, test scores, classroom management, contrived standards, isolated disciplines, and fixed, immutable schedules that disregard the learner's "state of readiness."

Workshop participants will come away with concrete examples of learning communities that demonstrate that:

- -Learning is social, ethical, natural, ecological, messy, compassionate, shared, open, visual, verbal, kinesthetic, and performing.
- -Innovation in education is at the edges, not at the core. The core is vested entirely in the status quo.
- -The "open source" model is the future of education. Apprenticeship, learning-by-doing, participatory "guilds" all are inherent in the open source model and all are core, sustaining precepts for a 21st century model of education.

The founders of Ridge and Valley Charter School, in Blairstown, NJ, considered many possibilities- from a Homeschool Cooperative to a private school and, finally, adopted a mission goal of a public school which any child in the state of New Jersey can enter- funded by the taxes of their hometown. The school then faced not only the challenge of finding parents and students who wanted a different type of education but a also a political system that did not want change. Seven years later NJ had it's first rural Charter School. One based on a child's potential, rather than accelerated statewide test scores.

#### Carmel's Student Academic Management System

Location: Bush Hall

SAMS

Upon entry into our school, a student's academic level and their goals for achievement are determined through entry testing, prior standardized testing, and through student work samples and portfolio. Once student level and achievement has been mapped, then an individualized plan is written with each student. In the plan, prescriptive objectives are developed to establish any missing components or gaps in a student's education. This plan, which is a student's scope and sequence, is documented and managed through a newly developed plan sheet called a Matrix. It shows the scope and sequence per grade level, and the teacher fills in assignments, special additional work, learning style, and direct teaching notes. This plan sheet documents and manages the academic standards, computer based instruction, assignments, field trips, extracurricular activities, special needs, projects, teacher grading, notes, essential questions, and multiple intelligences. Students maintain their own program and the teacher manages a master copy.

To implement this individualized program in a classroom setting, a workgroup program is employed. This program allows us to coordinate differentiated, cooperative, project-based instruction and integrate Technology, Workplace, and the Arts into all other subject areas. This provides students many avenues for mastering their individualized plan. These methodologies offer immediate feedback to the student allowing for adjustments. A CD or DVD multiyear record is available of the

child's education whenever the student applies to another school, or the teacher wants to review previous work.

## SelfDesign: The Art and Science of Creating a Human Being by Being Human

The epistemology of being human, is the how of what it is that we do when we think, feel, understand, learn, believe and wonder. Our culture and our education system perpetuate shared hallucinations about human identity and what is worth knowing. The New School (Maine) & The School Around Us

The School Around Us (K-8) means exactly what it's name implies. The New School tag line says "A Community-Centered Secondary School." The experiences of these two schools provides a focus for a participant dialogue on the community as classroom. Teachers and students from these two schools will present their experiences with science field studies for local organizations, recording stories of elders, community greenhouse, partnership with local historical societies, and many more approaches to learning outside a school building and bringing the town to the school.

## **Teachers' Experiences with Design Conversation in the Context of School Change**

Location: Room #5
Helga Stokes

The purpose of the study is to explore design conversation as it is lived out in the communication processes amongst stakeholders involved in school change. School reform efforts in various countries look for increased participation in design and decision-making at the local level. Design conversation, embedded in the theoretical framework of systems thinking and systems design has, to date, not been researched as a theoretical construct. Experiences and perceptions form the core of the data, and therefore a phenomenological research approach was chosen. Data were gathered at three internationally dispersed sites in the Czech Republic, Germany, and the United States of America. The results indicate that teachers do value the process, describe changing mindsets, designing visions, concrete strategies, equitable participation, trust, and risk taking. The study hopes to lead those interested in school change to increased use and evaluation of design conversation in educational systems design.

#### Values Go to School: Exploring Ethics with Children

The third video in the Learning Child Series, Values Go to School: Exploring Ethics with Children, will be screened at the conference, and air on public television stations this year. Produced by Jonathan Diamond Associates in association with the Child Development Institute at Sarah Lawrence College, the program documents how values emerge and take shape in the

school context, and how teachers can encourage children's understanding and expression of the ethical questions that permeate our everyday lives.

The new documentary suggests that ethical isasues are inseparable from the life of the classroom and the school. What kinds of values do we want to uphold and foster? How are ethical values communicated to children? What role should schools play in facilitating children's understanding of ethical questions? Awareness of how values are communicated in the school context enables teachers and administrators to make informed decisions about curriculum and educational process.

Values Go to School documents the ways in which schools can play a central role in the development of reflective consciousness about ethical questions and provide the context for encouraging genuinely humanistic values.

Education plays an important part in how our capitalist economy reproduces itself. By challenging how education happens, like it or not, we threaten the basis of capitalist reproduction. At the same time, we lay the groundwork for alternative economic relationships to emerge. In this workshop, I will present a simple but profound way to think about how our capitalist economy works and how traditional education fits in. I will then challenge participants to identify ways in which alternative education interrupts and contests how capitalism shapes education. This exercise will provide a helpful context in which to discuss the difficulties we face in working for educational alternatives as well as the many opportunities that we are presented with for transforming the economic system much for the better.

## Introduction to Formal Consensus Decisionmaking (ends at 2:45pm)

In this workshop, participants will learn to organize, facilitate, and participate in meetings based on Formal Consensus. We will focus on the theory and principles of Formal Consensus and how it is different from both majority rule voting and other versions of consensus. ## SelfDesign Paragon: A Look At the Process of Learning From Eight Different Vantage Points

In the industrialization of schooling we have seen the transformation of learning into an appropriate response to instruction. Teaching and instruction of content and curriculum and the measurable results of instruction are what education has become in our schooling systems. Our greatest asset as human beings is our ability to learn, and yet in schooling our array of at least eight different modes of learning is reduced to just one. This model will look at the variety of learning that emerges in our living and outlines strategies for each one. The shift from content to process brings learning from content to experience, from outside to inside. Learning is withing the domain of human experience and only within the context of neurological events can our observations of human behavior begin to reveal the dimensions of learning.

## Between School and Community: Making Bridges Instead of Walls

Schools are expected to provide education to children so that they grow up to be responsible and happy members of society. However, of late, schools are increasingly being questioned for what they teach, how they teach, and most importantly what children learn about relating to each other in school and outside. Incidence of indiscipline, indecent behaviour, violence has risen substantially in schools. As a consequence schools are becoming target of criticism from parents and society.

On the other hand, schools have been holding parents responsible for providing inadequate care, attention and support to children at home, an essential condition for learning in schools. Principals and teachers opine, that parents are abdicating their responsibility of nurturing children, thereby not contributing in their learning. When this results in undesirable outcome, schools are blamed. Thus between the two of them each is blaming the other. However, what is true is that family and schools, two extremely important institutions responsible for nurturing future citizens are under severe pressure due to fast paced, radical and unexpected changes in society. Both the institutions are experiencing the pressure and groping for the ways to cope. Parents who should be natural 'stakeholders' in the process of education of their children, are becoming mere 'consumers' of the service called 'education'. Schools, instead of welcoming parents as partners, create barriers and restrictions to avoid them. Between the two, where there would have been a natural bridge to reach higher goals, there exist an ever increasing wall; thwarting the progress of both. The workshop will aim to examine some of the issues associated with this, with an objective to identify the process of dismantling the 'wall' and replacing it with a 'bridge'

Based on the inputs from participants and experience of the facilitator, factors which contribute towards this state will be identified. Subsequently, based on actual experience from several schools, conditions which facilitate a co-operative spirit

between school, parents and community will be shared. Workshop will conclude with possible directions and strategies for constructive initiatives in this direction.


